

FORENSIC DNA SCIENCE AND PROGRESS

REVISITING THE BASICS AND REVAMPING THE STATISTICS: AN INTRODUCTION TO PROBABILISTIC GENOTYPING INTERPRETATION METHODS

Forensic DNA testing has transformed the work of all those involved in the criminal justice system. The power of DNA as a crime fighting tool cannot be overstated; Dr. John Butler, preeminent forensic scientist and author of the seminal textbooks in forensic DNA has stated that "[t]housands of cases have been closed with guilty suspects punished and innocent ones freed because of the power of a silent biological witness at the crime scene."

During the first part of the seminar, Supria (Pia) Rosner, DNA Technical Leader and Supervising Criminalist for the LAPD Serology/DNA Unit, will provide a review of forensic DNA basics as well as an update on recent advances in testing. Marguerite Rizzo, DIC of the Forensic Science Section, will address relevant legal issues related to these updates.

During the second part of the seminar, Learden Matthies, Supervising DNA Criminalist for the LASD Scientific Services Bureau, will introduce the revolutionary advances in interpretation and statistical analysis of DNA data.

Throughout the nation, as well as the world, DNA forensic laboratories are implementing "probabilistic genotyping" methods for DNA interpretation. Learden will introduce "STRmix", a groundbreaking DNA interpretation software program being adopted by the LAPD, LASD, and the majority of forensic DNA laboratories in California. Marguerite Rizzo will discuss the unfolding challenges and impact this innovation to DNA interpretation will have on all DDAs presenting DNA evidence in court.

Supria "Pia" Rosner oversees DNA technical operations for the Los Angeles Police Department Forensic Science Division. As the DNA Technical Leader and Supervising Criminalist for the Serology/DNA Unit, Pia manages the training and competency testing of 28 DNA analysts, 25 DNA Technicians and 8 Laboratory Technicians. Pia has been in the forensic DNA field for over 13 years. Pia received her Bachelors of Science from the University of California at Berkeley and her Masters of Forensic Science from John Jay College of Criminal Justice.

Learden Matthies is a Supervising Criminalist for the L.A. County Sheriff's Department. She has worked in the Biology Section for the entirety of her nearly 20-year career and is passionate about all things DNA. Learden is involved with bringing new technology into the Biology Section, which most recently includes probabilistic genotyping software.





SEX CRIMES: UNDERSTANDING VICTIMS AND PERPETRATORS

Everyone, including jurors, law enforcement, judges, and attorneys may have pre-conceived ideas about how victims respond to sexual assault. This seminar will focus on how to combat these common misconceptions and provide useful tools to successfully prosecute sexual assault cases.

How to Conceptualize Sex Offenses Like an Expert

Jody A. Ward, Ph.D., is a licensed forensic psychologist with 20 years of experience treatment of sex offenders and victims of child sexual abuse. Dr. Ward has testified as an expert in over 450 jury trials (including death penalty mitigation testimony) for both the prosecution and the defense regarding the psychological profiling of sex offenders, child sexual abuse accommodation, and delayed disclosure of sexual abuse. Dr. Ward is also an expert on psychosexual evaluations and recidivism risk of sex offenders.

Sexual Assault: Understanding the Complexities of Victim Behaviors and Reactions

Mindy Mechanic, Ph.D., is a professor in the Department of Psychology at California State University, Fullerton and a clinical psychologist whose work focuses on the psychosocial consequences of violence, trauma and victimization with an emphasis on violence against women, including intimate partner violence, sexual assault, and stalking. Her work has addressed the mental health consequences of trauma, such as Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and depression. Dr. Mechanic is also a forensic psychologist who regularly works as a legal consultant and expert witness in cases involving interpersonal violence, sexual assault, intimate partner violence, and stalking.

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

CELL PHONE EVIDENCE

(How to Legally Obtain, Analyze, and Use It In Your Case)

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

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
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

CROSS-EXAMINING MENTAL HEALTH "EXPERTS"

Last year, in *McWilliams v. Dunn*, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that indigent defendants have a right to mental health experts who can assist in their defense. As such, cross-examining these experts may become more routine.

During the first part of the seminar, DDA Frank Santoro will provide an update on relevant case law and statutes, as well as how to successfully prepare for and cross-examine mental health experts.

Roberto Flores de Apodaca, Ph.D., will then discuss ways that mental health experts can be challenged ethically and effectively in the following areas: 1. Voir Dire (regarding possible advocacy in their track record as consultants and abiding by professional standards of performance); 2. Accuracy in using the DSM-5 Manual (conforming to the actual criteria for a diagnosis and other challenges); 3. Use of Psychological Testing (over-reliance on clinical tests and under-reliance of Forensic Assessment Instruments); and 4. Aspects of Defense reports that undermine their credibility (e.g. advocacy, giving the defendant the benefit-of-the-doubt).



Frank C. Santoro, II, DDA, joined the office in 1998 and is currently the Deputy-in-Charge of the Compton Juvenile Office. He spent a combined 13 years in the Hardcore Gang, the Organized Crime, and the Major Crimes Divisions. He has prosecuted approximately 80 jury trials, including 40 murder and 6 death penalty cases. He regularly lectures at the Office's Felony Trial College, Homicide College, and Death Penalty Seminar. He has previously lectured at the Forensic Science Forum, for the LA County Coroner's Office, and for the CDAA. Frank has received recognition from both local and federal law enforcement, and is also a

recipient of the DDA of the Month award.



Roberto Flores de Apodaca, Ph.D., has been a Professor of Psychology since 1978 (Cal State Long Beach for 22 years, the past 17 at Concordia University Irvine), and an independent practitioner of Forensic Psychology since 1986. He has performed over 3,000 evaluations in adult and juvenile criminal cases at the request of Judges, District Attorneys and Defense Attorneys in Orange and surrounding counties. Understanding and Dealing with Vicarious Trauma

This training seeks to bring awareness of the existence of vicarious trauma and compassion fatigue among prosecutors. It looks at the definitions and causes of this secondary trauma, and how a person can recognize if he/she is suffering from it. Finally, it will explore strategies available to combat its effects.

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

DIFFICULT WITNESSES: IMPEACHMENT AND WHAT TO DO WHEN A WITNESS JUST WON'T COOPERATE

This seminar will focus on how to handle difficult or recalcitrant witnesses and how to properly impeach and preserve testimony using prior inconsistent statements, as well as prior convictions and misconduct. Focusing on the overlapping Evidence Code sections that apply, this presentation will also demonstrate how to apply proper impeachment techniques to more fully preserve and use former testimony when difficult witnesses later become disappearing witnesses at trial. The discussion will also include what to do when a witness takes the 5th, and the appropriate procedure for securing difficult witnesses for trial and the use of contempt of court when a witness simply refuses to testify.

Christine Bannon, DDA is a senior prosecutor in the San Diego District Attorney's Office and has been practicing criminal law for over 25 years. Christine has handled felony cases throughout the office but spent the bulk of her career in the Gang Prosecution Unit. Over her career, Christine has successfully prosecuted countless violent crimes cases. In January of 2017, Christine joined the Appellate and Training Division. Christine teaches in San Diego and statewide sharing her expertise on sentencing, prior convictions, CA discovery law and practice, evidence, trial strategy, 5th Amendment claims and immunity, and the intricacies and challenges of handling difficult and recalcitrant witnesses at trial.

Lindsey Carinci, DDA is a senior prosecutor in the San Diego District Attorney's Office and has been a district attorney for over 17 years. SCIENCE BASED INTERVIEWING

Detectives from the Los Angeles Police Department's elite Major Crimes and Robbery Homicide Divisions are working with the U.S. Government's High Value Detainee Interrogation Group to modernize the way that police agencies interrogate suspects.

This training will introduce new science based methods of interviewing suspects, including using rapport-building strategies, open-ended questioning techniques, strategic use of evidence, and silence to gather verifiable information.

Detective Mark Severino is a thirty-two-year veteran of the Los Angeles Police Department, and is currently a Detective Supervisor for LAPD's Major Crimes Division, Criminal Investigation Section. Detective Severino is one of the cofounders of the Criminal Investigation Section, whose mission is to investigate individuals/groups engaged in criminal activity that may have a Terrorist and/or a Transnational Organized Crime nexus. Detective Severino's expertise consists of traditional and non-traditional investigative strategies and methods to include undercover platforms/operations, covert operations, physical and electronic surveillance, informant handling, criminal case preparation and prosecutorial filings.

Detective Severino is responsible for coordinating and managing research data, protocols and advanced undercover interrogation training between LAPD's Major Crimes Division and the U.S. Government's High Value Detainee Interrogation Group (HIG).

JURY SELECTION - PRACTICAL TIPS

(How to deal with Wheeler/Batson Challenges in Trial and Post-Conviction)

This seminar will focus on how to effectively handle *Wheeler/Batson* challenges during jury selection, as well as defending against them post-conviction. The presentation will include: the three-step process utilized by courts when assessing an alleged improper dismissal of a juror based upon invidious discrimination; comparative analysis in the selection or excusal of jurors; jury selection in capital cases; use of prosecutor's jury notes and potential for their discovery; and implicit bias. There will also be a brief presentation on the recently amended discovery statute, *Penal Code § 1054.9*, and how to litigate a juvenile sentence mitigation *Franklin* hearing.

IMPACT OF TRAUMA ON THE PROSECUTION COMMUNITY

Members of prosecutor's offices and law enforcement are routinely exposed to cases involving traumatic incidents as well as the daily pressures of life. 

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ACCOMPLICE LIABILITY FOR MURDER

(How to deal with SB 1437 in Trial and Post-Conviction)

Senate Bill (SB) 1437 recently made significant changes to accomplice liability for murder. Under amended Penal Code (PC) §188 (a)(3), all principals must personally act with malice aforethought to be guilty of murder, except as provided in a new limited first degree felony-murder rule found in PC §189 (e). In addition to these prospective changes, SB 1437 added a new retrospective provision, PC §1170.95, which will require resentencing for all prior convictions obtained under a now-invalid theory of murder.

This seminar will discuss the new felony-murder rule, aiding and abetting, and the natural and probable consequence doctrine as theories of liability for an accomplice post SB 1437. It will also introduce the newly created Murder Resentencing Unit, provide an update on how to proceed with the PC §1170.95 petition process, and discuss the resources available through the Bureau of Investigations and the Bureau of Victim Services.

For many, one of the most challenging parts of a jury trial is cross-examination, even more so when it's the cross-examination of an expert witness. During this seminar, DDA Brian Kelberg will discuss how to prepare for a successful cross-examination of an expert witness.

Brian Kelberg, DDA: Brian has been a deputy district attorney for 42 years. He is the former Deputy-in-Charge of the Medical-Legal Section. During Brian's career, he has prosecuted a number of capital cases through penalty phase, as well as a nine-month jury trial of a licensed obstetrician for the murders of eight high-risk newborns and one viable fetus. He has provided assistance to a number of our deputies, as well as prosecutors in other offices, on subjects such as forensic pathology, forensic psychology and neuropsychology and forensic psychiatry.

Brian represented the prosecution at a significant number of capital case habeas corpus evidentiary hearings, addressing claims of Atkins intellectual disability barring capital punishment, and ineffective assistance of counsel at both the guilt and penalty phases — claims requiring the presentation of expert testimony from fields such as gangs, firearms and ballistics, forensic toxicology, DNA, neuropsychology, forensic psychiatry, crime scene investigation, mitigation investigation and legal malpractice. Also, for many years, he taught Forensic Evidence at two local law schools. Last year, Brian received the Ken Lamb Distinguished Achievement Award.

OPENING STATEMENT: HOW TO WIN IN OPENING

During this presentation, DDA Frank Santoro will discuss all aspects of a successful opening statement, including: how to be persuasive without arguing; the appropriate use of a theme or case theory in opening; the law governing what is and is not permissible in opening statement; the proper use of PowerPoint; and public speaking techniques.

Frank C. Santoro, II, DDA: Frank started with the Office in March of 2008. His assignments include the Torrance Branch Office, CT-11, eight years in the Hardcore Gang Division, one year in the Organized Crime Division (OCD), and three years in the Major Crimes Division. He has prosecuted a total of 81 jury trials, including 38 murders and six death penalty cases with five defendants on death row. Frank is currently the Assistant Head Deputy of the Juvenile Division and was formerly the Assistant Head Deputy of OCD.

HOW TO GIVE YOUR MOST PERSUASIVE CLOSING ARGUMENT

Closing argument is unquestionably a critical stage of the trial process. During this portion of the seminar, DDAs Phil Stirling and Eric Neff will discuss: best practices and legal pitfalls; organizational options; the pros and cons of PowerPoint; as well as how thoughtful and passionate trial preparation can improve a closing argument. 

How to Handle Incidents Involving Foreign Mission Personnel and Their Family Members in the United States

DUTY IN THE FACE OF CORRUPTION - A PROSECUTOR'S STORY

TERRENCE HAKE, Assistant State's Attorney - Cook County, Illinois

Mr. Hake is a 1977 graduate of Loyola University of Chicago School of Law. He went to work directly as a prosecutor for Cook County, Illinois. He quickly learned that there were certain courts where it did not matter how good your facts were, the case still got dismissed at preliminary hearing. He heard rumors of corruption. In April, 1980, while still serving as an Assistant State's Attorney for Cook County, he was recruited to assist the FBI and US Attorney's Office in "Operation Greylord," an investigation of the Cook County Court system. For three and a half years, he worked undercover posing as a corrupt prosecutor accepting bribes from attorneys and later as an attorney in private practice making payoffs to judges and court personnel for the dismissal of cases. At the conclusion, the operation was one of the most successful undercover investigations in FBI history, resulting in the indictment of 103 judges, court clerks, defense attorneys, prosecutors and police officers. This is a fascinating story of corruption, greed and intrigue. Mr. Hake will show how the lessons learned then still apply now.

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

THINGS PROSECUTORS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT PHOTOGRAPHIC AND VIDEO EVIDENCE

Most criminal cases involve photographs, video, or other visual evidence. What is the value of that evidence? Would additional photographs be helpful? Did the witness see what they claim? Should the opposing expert be challenged? Is there more to the video than meets the eye? Does the image need to be authenticated? What does the metadata contained in these digital images tell us? These are some of the questions that Mr. Reis will address in this presentation to help us get the most benefit and information from photographic and video evidence.



George Reis: Mr. Reis is owner of Imaging Forensics in Orange County and has provided services in forensic photography, photographic analysis, and video analysis since 2004. Prior to this he worked for the Newport Beach Police Department for 15 years. He has testified more than 50 times in state, federal, and military courts as an expert in photography, photographic analysis, and video analysis. He is also certified in those fields by the International Association for Identification and the Law Enforcement and Emergency Services Video Association.

CELLULAR PHONE EVIDENCE: THE "New" DNA

Mr. Cook will describe, in layman's terms, the workings of cell phones, cellular networks, cell-site and Sector mapping, call detail records, cell technology, and other related issues. He will educate us on how to maximize the "hidden" evidence that is often lost or overlooked and is available in cell phones and Carrier records and how to obtain the information. Mr. Cook will also speak about recent changes in the law that affects how law enforcement obtains these records (SB-178 which adds *Penal Code §1546* et seq.).



James Cook: Mr. Cook is the owner of Premier Customer Connections and is a Wireless Expert with over 29 years of experience in the wireless industry. He has received training from every major carrier, including AT&T, Metro PCS, Sprint/Nextel, Verizon, and T-Mobile. Mr. Cook has testified over 70 times in state and federal court. He serves as an instructor for CDAA and the San Diego Regional Training Centers "ICI" and P.O.S.T. training programs, and has taught at the Sexual Assault Investigators Association Conference, Detective Symposiums, and the High

Policy on the Disclosure of Exculpatory and Impeachment Information (Formerly Known as the Brady Compliance Policy)

Brady to PC 1054.1(e) - Evolution of a Prosecutor's Primary Duty — We will discuss the sources of potential confusion for trial prosecutors in dealing with so-called "Brady" issues. We will cover why and how the newly-issued Disclosure Policy was written and issued as well as the evolution of the sensitive area of tracking allegations of peace officer misconduct.

Highlights of the Policy on the Disclosure of Exculpatory and Impeachment Information – This section will cover the more significant aspects of the newly-issued policy, as well as recent developments regarding a prosecutor's responsibility for the contents of peace officer personnel files.

ORWITS and DDA Referrals of Potential Impeachment Information - The Officer and Recurrent Witness Information Tracking System (ORWITS) tracks potential impeachment information involving "recurrent People's witnesses" and is intended to assist deputy district attorneys (DDA) in complying with their disclosure obligations. The presentation will focus on the functionality of ORWITS, which replaces the Brady Alert System, with accompanying screen shots to guide DDAs through the use of the database. The revised process for DDA referrals of potential impeachment information will also be covered.

Jason P. Lustig, Deputy-in-Charge – Jason started with the Office in 1989 and has been the DIC of the Discovery Compliance Unit for over three years. His past assignments include DIC of the Downey Area Office, Special Assistant to previous Assistant District Attorneys and Chief Deputies, JSID, and Major Narcotics.



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

OVERVIEW OF THE CONVICTION REVIEW UNIT

The Conviction Review Unit (CRU) was created in October of 2015 with the purpose of ensuring the validity of felony convictions and promoting transparency within the criminal justice system. This seminar will focus on the criteria for reviewing claims submitted to CRU and will discuss some of the cases reviewed by the Unit.

WRONGFULLY CONVICTED – A PERSONAL ACCOUNT

Quedellis Ricardo "Rick" Walker was convicted in 1991 of the stabbing and suffocation death of his former girlfriend, Lisa Hopewell. He was sentenced to serve 26 years to life in prison. After years of appeals, new evidence came to light, prompting the Santa Clara County District Attorney's Office to reopen the case. DNA evidence confirmed Walker was not the perpetrator. Mr. Walker was set free in June of 2003. Today, he works as a mechanic and uses his experience to promote positive change within the justice system.



AN INTRODUCTION TO INVESTIGATING AND PROSECUTING WHITE SUPREMACISTS

White supremacists commit both gang and hate crimes, but unlike traditional turf-based gangs, their motivation is often based in their belief system. Understanding what they believe, how they operate, and who they hate is critical to investigating and prosecuting them. Their ideology is often missed or misunderstood as motive for the crimes they commit. This course will introduce prosecutors and investigators to supremacists' ideological motivations, and give insight to understanding how to investigate and prosecute their crimes. 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



On January 1, 2016, Penal Code Section 1546 et seq. - the California Electronic Communication Privacy Act (CalECPA) went into effect, significantly changing the procedure for searching electronic devices (such as laptops and cellphones) and obtaining electronic communication information (from service providers such as Verizon, Facebook, and Google). This seminar will focus on how law enforcement investigators and prosecutors can continue to lawfully obtain this evidence while still complying with the requirements of CalECPA.

Rouman Ebrahim, DDA (High-Technology Crime Division); Donn Hoffman, DDA (High-Technology Crime Division); Philip Marshall, DDA (Major Narcotics Division): DDAs Ebrahim, Hoffman, and Marshall will discuss how this new law limits the ways this type of information can be obtained and imposes requirements on how to maintain it once it's in the possession of law enforcement. In addition, they will discuss discovery compliance and suppression issues addressed by this new set of statutes.

DUI-MARIJUANA PROSECUTIONS



Given the passage of Proposition 64 (The Adult Use of Marijuana Act) and the expected increase of individuals driving while impaired by marijuana, this seminar will focus on how to prosecute a DUI-Marijuana case. The seminar will start with an introduction to DTAPS (DUI Training and Prosecution Section) and how they are a resource to fellow DDAs, law enforcement, and criminalists on driving while impaired by drug and/or alcohol cases. Sex Trafficking in Los Angeles County: An Overview and Update

This training will cover the state of human sex trafficking in Los Angeles County. Human sex trafficking is a major topic in California. Los Angeles, as the largest county in California, has seen an increase in the filing and prosecution of sex trafficking cases in the last four years. There is a tremendous interest in human trafficking cases by federal and state governmental agencies and also non-governmental groups. This training will also briefly cover what sex trafficking is and is not and the issues that are presented in the filing and prosecution of these cases, when what you do may put you under the microscope of other governmental and non-governmental agencies.



Jane Creighton, DDA has worked for the LADA for 19 years. Since April of 2011, she has been assigned to the Sex Crimes Division where she prosecutes cases involving aggravated sexual assault, complex DNA issues, pimping and pandering, and human trafficking. In June of 2014, Ms. Creighton was designated as the Human Trafficking Coordinator for the Office, where she is responsible for prosecuting human trafficking cases; training; community outreach; legislative review of human trafficking related legislation;

and structuring proposals to more effectively and efficiently combat human trafficking in Los Angeles County.

Since February of 2014, she has been assigned to the Hardcore Gang Division, where she prosecutes gang murders and attempted murders. In July of 2015, Ms. Trutanich was designated as the Human Trafficking Committee Gang Expert for the Office's Human Trafficking Committee, where she is responsible for being a resource for her fellow Deputy District Attorneys and law enforcement on

the prosecution of the gang allegation in human trafficking cases; training on the use of the gang allegation as it applies to human trafficking cases; and legislative review of human trafficking related legislation involving gang issues.

Understanding the Immigration Consequences of a Guilty Plea

The Department of Homeland Security, Immigration and Customs Enforcement will present an overview of the agency, the immigration system and immigration law relevant to criminal prosecutions, as well as a foundation for understanding the immigration consequences of a guilty plea. Understanding how the immigration process works and what effect the criminal plea will have on a noncitizen's immigration status is now a factor to be considered during plea negotiations. In 2015, the State of California enacted *Penal Code §1016.3(b)*, which states, "[t]he prosecution, in the interest of justice, and in furtherance of the findings and declaration of Section 1016.2, shall consider the avoidance of adverse immigration consequences in the plea negotiation process as one factor in an effort to reach a just resolution."



UNDERSTANDING AND INTERVIEWING CHILD AND ADOLESCENT VICTIMS AND WITNESSES

Clark*, which ruled that when a teacher, social worker, or a doctor suspects abuse, the child's statements to them are admissible at trial, even if the child doesn't testify in court, due to the need to protect the child from imminent harm. Prior to joining USC Law, Professor Lyon was an attorney for the Children's Services Division of the Los Angeles County Counsel and a research associate at Harbor-UCLA Medical Center. He has published over 60 research papers and conducted more than 200 trainings to judges, attorneys, social workers, and psychologists.



Catherine S. Connell, MSW, LCSW: Ms. Connell is a licensed social worker and Child/Adolescent Forensic Interviewer with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Office of Victim Assistance. GETTING TO THE TRUTH:

USING SCIENCE-BASED INTERVIEWING TECHNIQUES

How do we know when a suspect or witness is telling the truth? There's a lot of traditional wisdom in answering that question. However, modern research is now telling us that much of that traditional wisdom may be wrong. A new research-based technique, known as the Strategic Use of Evidence (SUE), uses a framework for planning, structuring, and conducting the questioning of suspects and/or witnesses. The SUE framework operates on the premise that liars and truth-tellers use different strategies to convince. Studies have shown that SUE-trained interviewers achieved a higher level of accuracy.

Law enforcement investigators/detectives have begun to receive training in these different interviewing methods. These same techniques may also be useful to prosecutors in conducting their own interviews of suspects and/or witnesses.

Dr. Laure Brimbal, Ph.D., Iowa State University. Dr. Brimbal is a Postdoctoral Researcher at Iowa State University, as well as an Adjunct Lecturer at California State University, Los Angeles, and John Jay College (CUNY). She has conducted studies using the Strategic Use of Evidence techniques and has authored several published articles, including "Training in the Strategic Use of Evidence Technique: Improving deception detection accuracy of American law enforcement officers," Journal of Police and Criminal Psychology, February 18, 2016.

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

FORENSIC SCIENCE IN CRIMINAL COURTS The PCAST Report: Fact or Fiction?



This training will introduce Deputy District Attorneys to the recently issued Report to the President related to Forensic Science in the Criminal Courts. This report, authored by the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology (PCAST) is a follow-up to the 2009 National Academy of Sciences, "Strengthening Forensic Science in the United States" report. The 2016 PCAST report is highly critical of a number of "feature-comparison" forensic disciplines. PCAST is most critical of Firearm/Toolmark analysis. Many of the authors' erroneous and ill-founded conclusions related to the Firearm/Toomark comparison discipline will be addressed.

Speakers: Marguerite Rizzo, D.I.C. Forensic Science Section; James Carroll, LASD Crime Lab, Assistant Director: Jim has worked for the LASD Crime Lab for 18 years. He specializes in the analysis of firearm and toolmark evidence, as well as shooting incident investigation and reconstruction. Jim has conducted research and authored articles in the area of firearm and toolmark identification and also has extensive experience as an instructor, lecturer, and expert witness.

HABLIT: DEFENDING YOUR CONVICTIONS



ARSON: THE NUTS AND BOLTS OF THE CRIME

In the city of Los Angeles alone there are between 1,500 to 2,000 arson fires every year. Arson causes millions of dollars in property losses as well as numerous deaths and serious injuries. Yet, arson remains one of the most difficult types of cases to solve because of the challenging forensics in determining the origin and cause of fires, let alone identifying the perpetrators. This course will introduce prosecutors to the central concepts that are crucial to understanding arson forensics, including the unique legal concepts that govern arson prosecutions, and how to effectively present testimony from arson expert witnesses.

SEAN CARNEY, DDA, **Arson & Explosives Section, Target Crimes Division**: Sean Carney has a B.A. from UC Irvine, and a J.D. from USC Law School where he graduated Order of the Coif and received the Hon. Dorothy Wright Nelson Award for Excellence in criminal justice. For the past 17 years he has worked at the District Attorney's office with assignments in a number of specialized units including the Major Narcotics Division, the Organized Crime Division and for the past 6 years in the Arson and Explosives Section. He has been the lead prosecutor on a number of high profile arson cases including the Hollywood Serial Arsonist (*People v. Harry Burkhart*) as well as the DaVinci Fire (*People v. Dawud Abdulwali*).

ED NORDSKOG, Detective, Arson and Explosives, LA County Sheriff's Department: Det. Ed Nordskog is one of the foremost arson investigators in the country with 18 years of experience in arson and explosives. Since 1997 he has investigated over 1,800 arson cases, over 50 fire death scenes, and has been personally involved in 40 serial arson investigations. He is a former International Association of Arson Investigators (IAAI) "Investigator of the Year" and is an active instructor for the State of California POST in "Arson and Explosion Investigations" and "Homicide Investigation – Fire Deaths." Det. Nordskog has a Master's Degree from Cal State University – Long Beach and is the author of the books "Tortured Minds – Case Histories of Notorious Serial Arsonists" and "Fireraisers, Freaks and Fiends – Obsessive Arsonists in the California Foothills."



HUMAN SEX TRAFFICKING

Introduction: Lisa Coen, DIC - Human Sex Trafficking Section

D'Lita Miller - From Victim to Survivor to Advocate

In Los Angeles County, an estimated 3,000 children are trafficked for sex. Some are runaways, others are in the foster care system, while others are misled into the trade by pimps who pretend to be boyfriends. These pimps are often violent and sometimes tattoo their victim's face or neck to further humiliate them and discourage them from leaving.

D'Lita Miller is a survivor of sexual exploitation that started at age 11. In 2009, Ms. Miller's 16-year-old daughter became a victim of child sex trafficking, prompting Ms. Miller to become educated and empowered on the subject. Ms. Miller has more than 10 years of professional experience working to rescue young victims from the streets and empower those affected by human sex trafficking. Ms. Miller is the founder and executive director of Families Against Sex Trafficking (F.A.S.T). She is also the co-author and facilitator of a nationwide intervention curriculum, Ending the Game. Ms. Miller will share her personal story and provide guidance on how prosecutors and law enforcement officers can communicate with and more effectively assist those affected by these crimes.

CIVIL PROCEEDINGS IN A CRIMINAL COURT RESTORATION TO SANITY – PENAL CODE §1026.2

What are some of the fundamental differences between a standard Criminal Jury Trial and a Quasi-Criminal/Civil Jury Trial for PC §1026.2? DDA Sunita Popal will discuss the restoration of sanity standard, which includes: the burden shift to the petitioner/defendant; the standard of proof; appropriate jury instructions; jury standard for verdict; useful case law for expert testimony or hearsay; and EV §352, as it relates to the underlying facts and a PC §1026.2 jury trial.

Dr. Nicole Paglione, Clinical Director with Gateways Conditional Release Program (CONREP), will speak about their basis for a restoration opinion in PC §1026.2 reports to the court, CONREP structure, and best practices for DDAs handling these matters.

This will include what happens in the criminal court before the maximum period of confinement is reached (progress reports and PC §1026.2 trials) and what happens at the Hollywood Mental Health Courthouse aka "Department 95" after the max has been completed (PC §1026.5 petitions). He will also address the Defendant's rights, which must be personally waived, including a *Lomboy* advisement that the defendant could be kept in the state hospital or other treatment for the rest of his/her life, if found to still be dangerous.

Alternatives to Incarceration for Individuals with Substance Use Disorders and Mental Health Issues - Alternative Sentencing Courts Explained

What is available for individuals suffering from substance use disorders and mental health issues who are charged with a crime? IMMIGRATION ISSUES IN CRIMINAL LAW

Imagine you're in court on a case involving a non-citizen defendant, and defense counsel cites <u>Padilla</u>. Then, Penal Code sections 1016.2, 1016.3, and SB54 are referenced. You hear acronyms such as INA, DHS, USCIS, CBP, ICE, EOIR, DHHS, ORR, DACA, TPS, and NTA, mentioned. Terms like citizen, national, lawful permanent resident, non-immigrant/humanitarian/VAWA/T/S/U visas, asylum, undocumented, deportable, inadmissible, crime of moral turpitude, aggravated felony, moral character, admission, deportation relief, and cancellation, arise. In discussing potential disposition, triggers of deportability and inadmissibility enter the discussion: charges, sentences, and conduct included in the record of conviction. Or imagine your case involves post-conviction relief, and defense counsel cites <u>Pickering</u>, and references Penal Code sections 1016.5, 1018, 1203.43, and 1473.7. Now imagine you have attended this Seminar. You are prepared to address these immigration issues.

This Seminar will be presented by two experienced defenders from the Immigration Unit of the Los Angeles County Public Defender's Office. Attendees will survey the intersection of immigration and criminal law – "crim-imm" – including where it pertains to juvenile adjudications and the Special Juvenile Immigrant Status (SJIS), and will deepen their understanding of immigration issues from a defense perspective.

Bobby Hill, DPD, has practiced law since 1990, and since 1996 as a Los Angeles County Deputy Public Defender. Earlier, he interned as a certified law student with the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office. In between, he taught flying and practiced aviation litigation. Assigned now to the Immigration Unit at the Hall of Records, Bobby's previous assignments include Central Felonies, Major Frauds, Appellate, Compton Misdemeanors and Juvenile, Metropolitan Misdemeanors, and South Gate Misdemeanors. He volunteers with the Constitutional Rights Foundation Mock Trial Program, and presently serves on the Legislative Committee of California Public Defenders Association, and the Steering Committee of the Public Defenders Coalition for Immigrant Justice.

Alison Klein, DPD, joined the Los Angeles County Public Defender's Office in 2007, after graduating from Loyola Law School, first as a senior law clerk and then as an attorney. During her almost 14 years as a Deputy Public Defender, she has worked in various branch assignments throughout the County – Compton, Downey, Bellflower, Long Beach Juvenile and Adult, Juvenile Appellate, Central Felonies, and currently the Immigration Unit, housed in the Long Beach Branch. 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TOOLS FOR MITIGATING BURNOUT, COMPASSION FATIGUE & VICARIOUS TRAUMA aka "PREVENTING "SALTY SYNDROME"

Most everyone who signed up to work in the criminal justice system didn't think about the potential toll it could take on their emotional, physical and relational wellness. Being in the helping profession means being at risk for experiencing burnout, compassion fatigue and vicarious trauma. This effect can cause us to be "salty" or unempathetic, calloused and cause problems for us in our relationships at work and at home. Join Dr. Heather Williams as she increases our awareness and empowers us to increase tools for coping to mitigate "salty syndrome."

Heather Williams, PsyD - After spending the last 18 years responding to critical incidents in partnership with law enforcement and 5 years with the Orange County Sheriff's Department as the Regional Peer Support Coordinator, Dr. Williams established Premier First Responder Psychological Services. As a licensed psychologist, Dr. Williams provides individual, couples and EMDR therapy, 24/7 crisis response services, critical incident debriefing, peer support development, oversight, training/presentations, consultation and active shooter response and recovery coordination/crisis response services.

TRAUMA INFORMED CARE FOR CRIMINAL JUSTICE PROFESSIONALS

Being "trauma informed" is a phrase often heard these days as health and other service delivery systems seek to interact with people in a way that is most engaging and effective to support good outcomes. Understanding the nature and impact of trauma is also important to district attorneys because witnesses and other individuals key to successful case prosecution are likely to have experienced trauma. Trauma experiences are known to affect a person's brain functioning and other physiology, as well as their capacity to trust and engage in systems. This session is tailored to district attorneys, investigators, advocates, and other relevant criminal justice personnel, offering an overview of the principles of trauma and its impact on people. Understanding the effects of trauma and adjusting interviewing and other processes accordingly can support more effective interactions with key individuals in case development and prosecution.

Bren Manaugh, LCSW-S, CPHQ, CCTS, has more than 25 years' experience in trauma-informed care and developing resilience for both individuals and organizations. She is a certified clinical trauma specialist who has provided direct clinical services, had executive responsibility for medical and behavioral health services providing trauma-informed care, developed and delivered trauma training curricula, and served as the executive lead to transform an organization to trauma-informed care, incorporating 1,400 employees and 27 facilities.



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

Innovative at their inception three decades ago, drug courts confront a practical and ethical obligation to reimagine some core practices and assumptions. A shifting legal and public health landscape means, for example, increased scrutiny of the courts' focus on abstinence and mandated treatment, and the use of jail.

One publication argues the most effective way for drug courts to evolve is by integrating the practices and principles of harm reduction. Harm reduction aims to reduce the harms related to drug use, racialized drug policies, and social health disparities, with services not contingent on a person's willingness to change all behaviors.



The Public Safety Lab works with teams of social scientists and data scientists to support more effective and more equitable criminal justice practices. The Lab's work is supported by Arnold Ventures, the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative, the Pew Charitable Trusts, the William T. Grant Foundation, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the Proteus Fund, the Global Institute of Advanced Study, the Moore-Sloan Data Science Environment at New York University, and private donors. The Lab's projects include the Jail Data Initiative, a large-scale effort to collect daily individual-level jail records in over 1,000 county jails in the United States, and the Prosecutorial Reform Initiative, a collaborative effort with district attorney's offices to develop more effective prosecutorial policies. Professor Harvey is the author of two scholarly books and a co-authored casebook, in addition to numerous peer-reviewed articles. She is a member of the Board of Trustees of Ohio University.

Professor Harvey received her PhD in political science from Princeton University in 1995. She is a 1988 graduate of the Honors Tutorial College at Ohio University, where she was the recipient of a Harry S. Truman Scholarship, in recognition of academic excellence and commitment to public service.

As a prosecutor, she tried many of the state's first human trafficking cases, including related sexual assault, child abuse, and money laundering crimes. In her role as a founding member of the Miami Dade State Attorney's Human Trafficking Unit and Task Force, Jane developed policies and procedures to better identify and provide necessary services to trafficking victims as well as hold offenders accountable by using digital evidence and creative charging decisions. Before focusing on human trafficking, Jane served as the Chief of Litigation for the Misdemeanor Domestic Violence Unit where she trained new attorneys and oversaw the prosecution of domestic violence, stalking, and violations of civil protection orders. Throughout her career, she prosecuted felony level crimes of all types, including homicide, kidnapping, sexual assault, and other violent crimes.

Jane leverages her experience in the courtroom and in developing policies and procedures to assist prosecutors and allied professionals in developing a victim-centered, offender-focused approach to cases of domestic violence, stalking, sexual violence, human trafficking, and elder abuse. She provides trainings and technical assistance related to investigations, case analysis, and trial strategy, as well as authors and develops resources, publications, and curricula.

Jane graduated cum laude with a Juris Doctor from American University, Washington College of Law after earning a Bachelor of Arts in History from the University of Washington in Seattle. Prior to her legal career, she lived and taught English in Bangkok, Thailand. Jane is based in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Jennifer Landhuis (M.S.) is the Director of the Stalking Prevention, Awareness, and Resource Center (SPARC), an AEquitas initiative. As Director of SPARC, she oversees the multi-faceted programming on stalking, including the development of resources and

publications as well as training and technical assistance. Jennifer has over 22 years of experience as an educator and advocate on the issues of stalking, domestic violence, and sexual assault.

Prior to joining SPARC, Jennifer was the Director of Social Change at the Idaho Coalition Against Sexual & Domestic Violence. In this capacity, she managed a variety of projects, including the Idaho Coordinated Response to Sexual & Domestic Violence and the Idaho Victims Assistance Academy.

She also designed and facilitated state and national trainings on stalking, domestic violence, and sexual assault to build the capacity of criminal justice systems.



He has provided assistance to a number of our deputies, as well as prosecutors in other offices, on subjects such as forensic pathology, forensic psychology and neuropsychology and forensic psychiatry.

Brian represented the prosecution at a significant number of capital case habeas corpus evidentiary hearings, addressing claims of Atkins intellectual disability barring capital punishment, and ineffective assistance of counsel at both the guilt and penalty phases — claims requiring the presentation of expert testimony from fields such as gangs, firearms and ballistics, forensic toxicology, DNA, neuropsychology, forensic psychiatry, crime scene investigation, mitigation investigation and legal malpractice. ORWITS and DDA Referrals of Potential Impeachment Information - The Officer and Recurrent Witness Information Tracking System (ORWITS) tracks potential impeachment information involving "recurrent People's witnesses" and is intended to assist deputy district attorneys (DDA) in complying with their disclosure obligations. The presentation will focus on the functionality of ORWITS, which replaces the Brady Alert System, with accompanying screen shots to guide DDAs through the use of the database. The revised process for DDA referrals of potential impeachment information will also be covered.



DIPLOMATIC IMMUNITY AND PUBLIC SAFETY

How to Handle Incidents Involving Foreign Mission Personnel and Their Family Members in the United States

In their joint presentation, Assistant Director Joan C. ("Jo") Morningstar, from the U.S. Department of State, Office of Foreign Missions, and Special Agent Bradley T. Gilmore, from the Bureau of Diplomatic Security's Protective Liaison Division, will give an overview of:

- (1) Diplomatic and consular immunity, what it means, why it is important, and a description of the varying levels of diplomatic and consular immunity under customary international law and treaty;
- (2) How to handle incidents (DUIs, reckless driving, shoplifting, etc.) involving persons claiming to enjoy immunity;
- (3) What actions the State Department takes in such cases;
- (4) The Department's Enforcement program to handle "diplomats behaving badly"; and
- (5) How the State Department partners with law enforcement to ensure public safety.

During the second half of the seminar we will hear from Carmen Hills, Public Affairs Officer, in the U.S. Department of State, Bureau of Consular Affairs. Ms. Hills will focus on Consular Relations, specifically, law enforcement's role in the arrest and detention of foreign nationals, including the proper procedures for identifying a foreign national, notifying a foreign Embassy or Consulate of the detention, and allowing access if requested.

IMMIGRATION ISSUES IN CRIMINAL LAW

Imagine you're in court on a case involving a non-citizen defendant, and defense counsel cites <u>Padilla</u>. Then, Penal Code sections 1016.2, 1016.3, and SB54 are referenced. You hear acronyms such as INA, DHS, USCIS, CBP, ICE, EOIR, DHHS, ORR, DACA, TPS, and NTA, mentioned. Terms like citizen, national, lawful permanent resident, non-immigrant/humanitarian/VAWA/T/S/U visas, asylum, undocumented, deportable, inadmissible, crime of moral turpitude, aggravated felony, moral character, admission, deportation relief, and cancellation, arise. In discussing potential disposition, triggers of deportability and inadmissibility enter the discussion: charges, sentences, and conduct included in the record of conviction. Or imagine your case involves post-conviction relief, and defense counsel cites <u>Pickering</u>, and references Penal Code sections 1016.5, 1018, 1203.43, and 1473.7. Now imagine you have attended this Seminar. You are prepared to address these immigration issues.

This Seminar will be presented by two experienced defenders from the Immigration Unit of the Los Angeles County Public Defender's Office. Attendees will survey the intersection of immigration and criminal law – "crim-imm" – including where it pertains to juvenile adjudications and the Special Juvenile Immigrant Status (SJIS), and will deepen their understanding of immigration issues from a defense perspective.

Bobby Hill, DPD, has practiced law since 1990, and since 1996 as a Los Angeles County Deputy Public Defender. Earlier, he interned as a certified law student with the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office. In between, he taught flying and practiced aviation litigation. Assigned now to the Immigration Unit at the Hall of Records, Bobby's previous assignments include Central Felonies, Major Frauds, Appellate, Compton Misdemeanors and Juvenile, Metropolitan Misdemeanors, and South Gate Misdemeanors. He volunteers with the Constitutional Rights Foundation Mock Trial Program, and presently serves on the Legislative Committee of California Public Defenders Association, and the Steering Committee of the Public Defenders Coalition for Immigrant Justice.

Alison Klein, DPD, joined the Los Angeles County Public Defender's Office in 2007, after graduating from Loyola Law School, first as a senior law clerk and then as an attorney. During her almost 14 years as a Deputy Public Defender, she has worked in various branch assignments throughout the County – Compton, Downey, Bellflower, Long Beach Juvenile and Adult, Juvenile Appellate, Central Felonies, and currently the Immigration Unit, housed in the Long Beach Branch. She has been in the Immigration Unit since its expansion in December 2018. Her role in the Immigration Unit includes performing Padilla consultations for defense attorneys, conducting trainings, and responding to and pursuing motions for immigration-consequence-based post-conviction relief.
