



It focuses are to address mental health issues, reduce recidivism, and improve public safety through the use of judicial oversight, intensive supervision, comprehensive case management, evidence-based treatment, and drug testing. RST MHTC participants are a higher functioning client and typically have the ability to schedule and make appointments on their own. 


RST Mental Health Treatment Court - 2019

A. Demographics: The Majority of MHTC RST participants were White Males and 30 to 44 years of age












The Mental Health Treatment Court (MHTC) TCORE Calendar is a collaboration between the Sacramento Superior Court, District Attorney, Public Defender, Probation Department, Behavioral Health and the Transitional Community Opportunities for Recovery & Engagement (TCORE). The MHTC TCORE targets offenders assessed as moderate-risk and needs. The focuses of this court are to address mental health issues, reduce recidivism, and improve public safety through the use of judicial oversight, intensive supervision, comprehensive case management, evidence-based treatment, and drug testing. The program lasts at least one year but the length varies by the participant's needs.

TCORE offers participants individualized mental health services to support independence and a betterment of living. Individuals receive assistance from Personal Service Coordinators (PSCs), clinicians, nurses, psychiatrists, peer family advocates and others ready to work with them on their recovery goals. The length of stay varies depending upon need. Services provided include: residential and outpatient services, case management, benefits assistance, crisis response, intervention and stabilization, medication evaluation and support. Upon completion, suspended jail time is lifted, probation may be terminated, and the case may be dismissed.

The Mental Health Treatment Court (MHTC) is a collaboration between the Court, District Attorney's office, Probation Department, Office of the Public Defender, the Department of Health Services (Behavioral Health Services and Alcohol and Drug Services), and community-based providers. The MHTC, Full Service Partnership (FSP) targets the highest-risks and needs offenders. It is a 12-month minimum, voluntary, post-adjudicated, judicially supervised, treatment-based program for offenders with a documented mental health diagnosis and who may also have a co-occurring substance use disorder. The goals of MHTC are to reduce recidivism and offer cost effective alternatives to incarceration and hospitalization. Through treatment, frequent court appearances, and monitoring, the program will hold participants accountable while assisting them in achieving long-term stability and becoming successful and law abiding community members.

The DUI Treatment Court is a collaboration between the Sacramento Superior Court, District Attorney, Public Defender, Probation Department, Behavioral Health, Bridges, Wellspace, and other providers. The focuses of this court are to reduce alcohol-related crimes, address substance-abuse issues, reduce recidivism, and improve public safety through the use of judicial oversight, intensive supervision, comprehensive case management, evidence-based treatment, and drug testing. The program generally lasts at least one year but the length varies by the participant's needs. The focus population is individuals charged with a VC 23152 (DUI), who have three prior DUI misdemeanor convictions within a 10 year period.

The length of stay varies depending upon need. Services provided include: detoxification, relapse prevention, support groups, residential and outpatient services, case management, medication evaluation and support. Upon completion, suspended jail time is lifted and probation may be terminated.

Since 1995, the Sacramento County Adult Recovery Court program (formerly referred to as Drug Court) has been an effective, evidence-based solution to addiction and criminal behavior. People arrested for non-violent drug-related offenses, violations of probation, or certain property crimes have the opportunity to enter Recovery Court. Upon acceptance into Recovery Court, clients will participate in the program at the Recovery Treatment Center (RTC). The program has four levels and lasts approximately 8 - 12 months. RTC provides on-site outpatient drug/alcohol treatment; individual and group counseling; family counseling; nutrition; yoga; pro-social activities; mental health services; frequent drug testing; and probation supervision in the community. RTC also offers detox, residential, and sober living for clients who qualify.

The Reentry Court was formed in 2013, as a result of AB 109, Public Safety Realignment. It targets high-risk/needs offenders with a two year (with a waiver of all credits if sentenced to HALT or other designated jail-based program) or a three year or more pending sentence. The goal of the Court is to reduce recidivism and improve public safety through the use of judicial oversight and frequent court appearances, intensive supervision, comprehensive case management and treatment services, and drug testing. The Probation Department administers services through its Adult Day Reporting Center (ADRC), and includes: cognitive-behavioral treatment classes; referrals to community-based organizations; job skill assessments; vocational training; group, individual or family counseling; educational services including assessment, GED preparation and testing; emergency housing; family support services; pro-social activities; and participation in the Community Outreach Program to provide restitution to victims. The length of the program is a minimum of 12 months.

The ReSET Court is a collaboration between the Sacramento Superior Court, District Attorney, Public Defender, and other community partners. The focuses of the ReSET Court are to reduce sexual harm and improve public safety through the use of judicial oversight and counseling sessions. The focus population are female adults charged with sex work crimes: loitering with the intent to commit prostitution or offering the service of sex or completing a sex act in exchange for money or other compensation in violation of either PC 653.22(a) or 647(b). Participants may have other misdemeanor charges.

The main provider for this court is Community Against Sexual Harm (CASH), an organization created in 2008 to provide a safe and empowering space where women could receive support, referrals, food, and access to basic care. Services they provide (free of charge) include health and wellness education, group and individual counseling, trauma based therapy, life skills, and peer mentoring Generally, the program lasts from 3-6 months. One goal is to rescue survivors from a trafficking situation and provide structured programming to clear their criminal record.

California Penal Code (PC) section 1001.36, sets forth a discretionary pre-trial diversion procedure for any defendant charged with a misdemeanor or felony, who suffers from a mental disorder listed in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM) of Mental Disorders, the symptoms of which can be abated with treatment, if the mental disorder played a significant part in the commission of the charged offense. After defense counsel files an Application for Mental Health Diversion (MHD) pursuant to section 1001.36 with the court and a copy served on the prosecutor, the case is set for an MHD status conference where the Court shall make a finding a *prima facie* basis for diversion. If a basis is found, defense counsel shall submit a treatment plan. Once the Court reviews the treatment plan and finds it suitable, the Court shall grant the motion for MHD, stay criminal proceedings and the defendant shall have up to two years to complete the treatment.

California Penal Code (PC) section 1001.80 describes the pretrial diversion statute for current and former members of the United States military who are charged with a misdemeanor offense and who may be suffering from sexual trauma, traumatic brain injury, post-traumatic stress disorder, substance abuse, or mental health problems as a result of their military service (effective on January 1, 2015). Effective August 7, 2017, the statute was amended to specify that a misdemeanor offense for which a defendant may be placed in a pretrial diversion program may include a misdemeanor violation of driving under the influence or a driving under the influence and causing bodily injury. The program should be completed within one year from the date the application is granted and defendant will appear in court for periodic reviews. The Court shall assess whether the defendant should be ordered to participate in a federal or community-based treatment service program with a demonstrated history of specializing in the treatment of mental health problems, including substance abuse, post-traumatic stress disorder, traumatic brain injury, military sexual trauma, and other related mental health problems.
